

Physical Activity, Physical Education and School Sport at Greneway

Physical activity, Physical Education and School Sport are similar in that they all include physical movement, but there are crucial differences between them, as clarified in the following descriptions:

Physical activity is a broad term referring to all bodily movement that uses energy. It includes all forms of physical education, sports and dance activities. However, it is wider than this as it also includes indoor and outdoor play, work-related activity, outdoor and adventurous activities, active travel and routine, habitual activities such as using the stairs, doing housework and gardening.

Physical Education is the planned, progressive learning that takes place in school curriculum timetabled time and this is delivered to all pupils.

“The aim of PE is to develop physical competence so that all children are able to move efficiently, effectively and safely and understand what they are doing. The outcome – physical literacy – is as important to children’s overall development as literacy and numeracy.” (AfPE 2013)

This involves both ‘learning to move’ and ‘moving to learn’. The context for the learning is physical activity, with children experiencing a broad range of activities, including sport and dance.

School sport is the structured learning that takes place beyond the curriculum (extra-curricular) within school settings. Again, the context for the learning is physical activity. Our school sport programme has the potential to broaden, extend and enrich the learning that takes place in PE. It also forms a vital link with community sport and activity.

EXTRA - CURRICULAR PROGRAMME (OSL) and SPORTING PROVISION

We are very fortunate at Greneway to have an extensive extra-curricular programme covering most activities.

What is the Sainsbury's School Games?
